## FY21 Budget Update; Post-eviction moratorium work

Pamela reported out: The House Ways and Means Committee released its proposed FY21 budget last week, which is now being debated this week (note: debate on housing provisions will continue on 11/12/20). This is for the budget that covers July 1, 2020-June 30, 2021 but was delayed due to COVID-19 (partial budgets have been passed between 7/1 and now). The proposed budget contains several positive provisions to address homelessness (including a provision to prevent eviction if a tenant is in the process of applying for RAFT). You can read more about the proposed House budget here and the Network's priority budget amendments to it here.

The Network organized an **Emergency Legislative Briefing on Nov. 9** to discuss the eviction crisis post the end of the eviction moratorium and its impact here 9 Legislators/Offices attended along with 70 Network partners. Regional Housing Authority Directors presented on the overwhelming demand for RAFT homelessness prevention resources and advocates presented on the threat tenants are facing right now to their housing stability. <u>Click here</u> for the summary of the data presented.

The Network is advocating for adoption of <u>RAFT reforms</u> to streamline the process (in partnership with the regional housing authorities) and for adoption of the <u>Housing Stability bill</u> which will provide comprehensive protection for tenants, homeowners and small landlords. Pamela encouraged everyone to <u>join the Network blog</u> and be part of this advocacy effort.

## **Discussion:**

• Amanda Watson noted that landlords in Franklin County were advised that they must start the eviction process in Springfield Housing Court (Greenfield Housing Court is not open due to COVID); this could explain the relatively low numbers of Notices to Quit

- (34 in Franklin County since eviction moratorium ended). Amanda predicted the number will rise as landlords make it to Springfield.
- Janette Vigo reported over 2,500 RAFT applications since moratorium lifted; hey have shifted and increased staffing but it's not yet enough to keep up with the demand; Way Finders is also making staff available to help in the court, meeting with legal services, mediators and TPP to build collaborations through this
- It was noted that the RAFT application is extremely long, taking as many as 6 hours to complete
- Community Legal Aid encouraged people to apply to RAFT as soon as they get a Notice to Quit; also noted that CLA has hired two case managers one for Hampden, one for Hampshire/Franklin to assist with RAFT applications

- WomanShelter has 20 rooms, at capacity
