Centering Community Need and Equity

- Experience administering CARES Act funding
- Process led by Town Manager with input from most Town Departments and some Boards/ committees and community-based organizations (mirroring CDBG process)
- Decision making by Select Board
- Community needs discussed annually relative to CDBG process and this past year with Fair Housing Action Plan creation and plan updates (including open space and housing)
- Diversity, equity, and inclusion focus emerged prepandemic and strategy emerged as a result of National League of Cities assistance (Racial Equity Action Plan)


Arlington's ARPA Framework

Funding for meaningful and lasting impact for Town government and the Arlington Community.



American Rescue Plan Act of 2021





 Department of Planning and Community Development provided a memo describing the funding opportunity as a onetime opportunity to address economic issues in Arlington and strengthen housing affordability and stability while serving our most vulnerable residents including public housing residents, low-income households, and seniors.

Followed then-known spending requirements:

Public Health/Negative Economic Impacts - decrease the spread of COVID-19 and bring the pandemic under control; address costs incurred in addressing public health and economic challenges resulting from the pandemic; address the systemic public health and economic challenges that may have contributed to more severe impacts of the pandemic among low-income communities and people of color; and build on eligible expenditures under the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CAREs), including some expansions in eligible uses.

- Outlined three potential uses of ARPA funds for:
 - Tenant and Homeowner Assistance Fund
 - Small Business and Nonprofit Sustainability Fund, and
 - Affordable Housing Preservation and Development
- \$8,770,000 for Housing and Homelessness in Framework
- \$600,000 total for Equity and Outreach (\$100,000 Equity Audit)

- Clearly define issue, outline program goals, identify targets
- Memo outlined:
 - Background on issue being addressed
 - Program Design
 - Eligibility Criteria
 - Staff Recommendation

Tenant and Homeowner Assistance Fund

- Program forthcoming in February, outsourced application review and selection
- Funds offered to Arlington households that rent or own their home and have demonstrated inability to make rent or mortgage payments due to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The program provides assistance of up to \$2,500 per month, payable to the household's landlord or mortgage loan servicer. Not to exceed actual rent/ mortgage payment. Households earning 80% or less of the Area Median Income may receive up to four months of assistance. Those earning more than 80% AMI are eligible to receive up to two months of assistance
- All incomes are eligible, preference given to low- to moderateincome households

Affordable Housing Preservation and Development

- Housing Corporation of Arlington funding for capital and future projects
- Deepen subsidy for inclusionary zoning projects in progress or forthcoming and other affordable housing developments
- Arlington Housing Authority
- Social services- more comprehensive in proposal
 - Funds provided to HCA for Homelessness Prevention Program
 - Funds to programs addressing food insecurity
- Homelessness coordination and prevention coordinated by Health and Human Services
