# Western Massachusetts Network to End Homelessness Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Priorities

The Western Massachusetts Network to End Homelessness seeks to prevent and end homelessness through a Housing First approach that centers racial equity. Towards that end, its Fiscal Year 2025 state budget priorities include the following:

<u>Access to Counsel Program (NEW):</u> GOOD NEWS on the Governor's initial investment of \$3.5 million for Access to Counsel for low-income tenants and owner-occupant landlords. In addition, we urge passage of the bill's language to establish the framework for the Access to Counsel program.

Residential Assistance for Families in Transition (RAFT) (7004-9316): \$300 million to address the continuing housing instability crisis as evictions and homelessness rise in western Massachusetts. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$197m; FY24 budget: \$190m)

Housing Consumer Education Centers (HCECs) (7004-3036): \$12 million for HCECs to continue to provide the vital gateway to housing stability and opportunity across the region. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$8.7m; FY24 budget: \$10.4m)

<u>Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP) (7004-9024):</u> \$300 million to address the severe lack of affordable housing. (*FY25 Gov. budget: \$219m; FY24 budget: \$179m*)

Workforce Development (7004-0109): \$10 million to support the critical need for individual shelter providers to recruit and retain staff. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$0; FY24 budget: \$10m); and Homeless Individual Assistance (7004-0102): \$126 million to address the increasing demand for emergency shelter. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$110.7m; FY24 budget: \$110.7m)

<u>Older Adult Homelessness (NEW):</u> \$60 million to create bridge subsidies for up to 6,000 older adults facing housing instability — a challenge that is notably on the rise in the western four counties.

Home and Healthy for Good (Permanent Supportive Housing) (7004-0104): \$8.89 million to fund a vital resource for Permanent Supportive Housing in western Massachusetts and maintain the language supporting systems change to end homelessness. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$8.39m; FY24 budget: \$8.89m).

<u>Unaccompanied Homeless Youth Services (40000-0007):</u> \$15 million to create greater housing stability for youth and young adults ages 18–24 years who are without homes. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$10.5m; FY24 budget: \$11m)

<u>Western MA Earmarks:</u> Western MA Network to End Homelessness and Community **Action Pioneer Valley** (see next page for details)

#### Additional priorities include:

<u>Tenancy Preservation Program (7004-3045)</u>: \$2 million to preserve tenancies for households with disabilities who are facing eviction. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$2.042m; FY24 budget: \$2.042m)

#### **Public Housing**

- Public Housing Operating Subsidies (7004-9005): \$189 million to ensure housing stability for the current and future public housing residents at the nearly 43,000 deeply affordable homes provided by local housing authorities. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$112m; FY24 budget: \$107m)
- Public Housing Reform (7004-9007): \$7.7 million to fund administrative reforms and support the well-being of residents. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$1.25m; FY24 budget: \$1.3m)

<u>Alternative Housing Voucher Program (AHVP) (7004-9030)</u>: \$30 million to create more deeply affordable and accessible homes for people with disabilities. (FY25 Gov. budget: \$16.3m; FY24 budget: \$16.8m)

<u>HomeBASE Program (7004-0108)</u>: \$80 million to continue payments to households currently enrolled in HomeBASE that need an extension and to enroll new households in the program. (*FY25 Gov budget:* \$57.3m; *FY24 budget:* \$37m)

Fair Housing Trust Fund (NEW): \$2.5 million to address housing discrimination in our communities.

### **Regional Earmarks**

# The Western Massachusetts Network to End Homelessness Earmark (7004-0107)

• \$150,000 to continue the coordination and collaboration necessary to accomplish the Network's mission to prevent and end homelessness across the four western counties with a Housing First approach that centers racial equity.

# Community Action Pioneer Valley (for the Three County Continuum of Care)

• \$830,000 to provide critical gap funding to maintain its permanent supportive housing and rapid rehousing programs for 200 formerly homeless individuals.
