




Annual Point-in-Time Count





Homelessness in Western MA: Trend 2021–2025









Unsheltered Homeless at Point-in-Time Count

Trend 2021–2025






Location of Unsheltered Homeless as of January 29, 2025

Renters are struggling to keep up with steep rent increases

Rents spiked post-COVID




- Hampden, Hampshire, Franklin Counties: up 32.5% since 2021
- Berkshire County: up 39.7% since 2021

Throughout Western MA, 54% of renters are cost-burdened, meaning they pay more than 30% of income for rent while 32% of renters pay more than 50% of income for rent



Eviction Filings are High and Rising


The number of evictions increased 66% from 2022 to 2024





Demand for RAFT Continues to Rise

First quarter demand has risen 46% since 2023



Housing ends homelessness: We're building more housing We need to build more

Progress



The Affordable Homes Act passed last year, authorizing \$5.1 billion in spending over the next 5 years and included:

- Eviction Record Sealing for certain types of cases
- Flexible Supportive Housing Pool Fund
- Fair Housing Trust Fund
- Accessory Dwelling Units by right
- Over the last year, 2,068 people moved from homelessness into permanent housing
- Western MA has 1,239 units of affordable housing in the development pipeline including 175 units of supportive housing



Challenges



Western MA has a 19,000 unit affordable housing gap



Good news: **Western MA Housing Coalition** and **MA Supportive Housing Pipeline Coalition** offer local and statewide vehicles for addressing the gap



We need bold leadership now more than ever

The Federal Threat

The Trump Administration threatens housing stability nationwide with proposals to:

- Cut HUD's budget by 44%, resulting in the loss of housing subsidies for tens of thousands of people
- Abandon the concept of Housing First, embracing a punitive, shelter-based strategy instead
- Eliminate federal leadership, cutting the US Interagency Council on Homelessness and decimating HUD staff

Right now: The US House passed a budget reconciliation bill with massive cuts to Medicaid and SNAP; Senate action is next



ACTING BOLDLY: What Massachusetts Can Do

Budget Priorities

FY25 Supplemental Budget:

Fund the Fair Housing Trust Fund at \$1 million

FY26 Budget:

- Fund Access to Counsel at \$3 million
- Adopt RAFT and HomeBASE Policy Review
- Fund Individual Emergency Shelter at \$115 million
- Fund Supportive Housing at \$13 million



ACTING BOLDLY: What Massachusetts Can Do

Legislative Priorities

Give municipalities the option to:

- Stabilize rents and protect tenants (H.2328/S.1447)
- Pass the Tenant Opportunity to Purchase Act (H.1544/S.998)
- Pass a transfer fee for affordable housing (H.3056/S.1937)

Statewide:

- Strengthen access to counsel (H.1952/S.968)
- Stop the criminalization of homelessness (H.274/S.1120)
- Enact the Supportive Housing Finance Board (H.1552/S.991)
